Technology: Why It's More Important Than Ever

Speech disabilities, and communication disorders make interacting with family and friends challenging.

Individuals with Aphasia often rely on visual cues such as facial expressions, gestures, or written words to enhance their speaking and understanding; technology can be a game changer.

The ATEL Program is looking to both <u>improve</u> <u>access</u> and <u>acquisition</u> <u>of technology</u>, to individuals with disabilities, but also making sure that there are opportunities to receive <u>Tech</u> <u>Training</u> around the state both in person and virtual.

IP Relay

IP Relay connects telephone conversations between people who are Deaf, Hard of Hearing, DeafBlind or have a Speech Disability using an internet-connected device and the IP Relay application.

Once connected, all you need to do is type what you want to say to the IP Relay operator. The IP Relay operator then reads your message aloud to your caller and types your caller's response back to you.

Speech to Speech Relay

Speech-to-Speech (STS) Relay is especially useful for people who have difficulty speaking or being understood on the telephone. STS involves specially trained Communication Assistants (CA) who are familiar with the speech patterns of a wide variety of individuals who have difficulty being understood. Establish a Customer Profile to store helpful information about your calls. This will allow the CA to process your calls more efficiently. Dial 711 for operator.

Captel Relay

Captel Relay is for people with some degree of hearing loss, the Captioned Telephone works like any other telephone with one important addition: It displays every word the caller says throughout the conversation. CapTel users can listen to the caller and can also read the written captions in display window. Although other disability groups can benefit from captioning, like people with Aphasia, you do have to be diagnosed with a hearing loss to use this service. There are both landline Captioning phones and Apps.

Download one of Captel Relay Mobile Apps; there are many different Captel Apps: CaptionCall, InnoCaption, CaptionMate, Nagish, and Hamilton Relay.

Apple Accessibility

Live Speech

Live Speech works on the iPhone, iPad, and Mac, allowing users to type what they want to say and have it spoken out load during phone calls and FaceTime calls, as well as in-person conversations."

Personal Voice

With Personal Voice, you can create a synthesized voice that sounds like your own to communicate with family and friends. Use your Personal Voice to type to speak in FaceTime and phone calls, assistive communication apps, and in-person conversations.

Android Accessibility

Live Transcribe

Live Transcribe is a smartphone application to get realtime captions developed by Google for the Android operating system.

Apple and Android Accessibility

Live Captions

You can have someone speak near your phone, and it will print their words on your device screen. This is an excellent tool if you like to hear and read simultaneously for better understanding.

Speak Screen/Select to Speak

Have your device read everything on the screen to you. You can read along or use this to hear the words if you have trouble reading.

Speech Apps

Speech-language pathologist (SLP) have experience working with adults with aphasia and other communication challenges and can share their insights on what works best for them from the wide range of **speech** therapy **apps.**
